Memorial Day Weekend

FARM BILL

Congress left town for the Memorial Day recess with a long list of unfinished business awaiting when the House and Senate return to action on June 2. Of major importance to agriculture and forestry and NAUFRP institutions, the House and Senate voted to override President Bush's veto of the Farm Bill prior to adjournment. The Farm Bill veto override was the second of the Bush presidency and was another indication of the growing number of Republican lawmakers who are putting distance between themselves and President Bush on key domestic policy issues.

The Farm Bill conference agreement, totaling some 673 pages, sustains commodity support programs, and puts major focus on energy production from agricultural waste products, particularly production of biofuels from cellulosic feedstocks. The bill also enhances various conservation programs, and expands the food stamp program. Of particular interest to NASULGC universities is the creation of the new National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) to provide greater coordination and resources for the various research programs of USDA. This new program was part of the Create-21 Initiative pursued for the last three years by NASULGC, <http://www.create-21.org/>. Authority is provided for a major increase in USDA research dollars for university programs with an emphasis on competitive grants and collaborative efforts across disciplines and state boundaries. The Farm Bill extended the authorization for RREA and approved language including 1890 institutions within the McIntire-Stennis program. Several titles of the Farm Bill contained provisions regarding forestry. Below you will find a chart developed within USDA summarizing the major forestry provisions in the Farm Bill.

FY 09 APPROPRIATIONS UNCERTAIN

Before leaving town, the Senate passed its version of the Supplemental Appropriations bill to provide additional funding for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. Also included in the Senate bill was new funding for educational benefits for veterans, an extension of unemployment benefits, and other domestic spending not requested by President Bush. The House will consider the

Supplemental when it returns in June and the House Democratic leadership will have a difficult task passing a bill that has opposition from both sides of the aisle. Many House Democrats oppose additional war funding unless the bill also contains provisions regarding troop withdrawal and specific benchmarks for progress to be made by the Iraqi government. President Bush opposes the inclusion of such language and also opposes adding domestic spending in the Supplemental. The President will encourage Republican House members to oppose any such spending.

The House and Senate hope to finish a FY 09 Budget Resolution in early June. Final passage of the Resolution was delayed this week because of the glitch in the Farm Bill conference report (the entire trade title of the bill was left out of the printed version sent to the White House). Resolving the Farm Bill situation delayed House floor action on the Budget Resolution and the House leadership opted to adjourn and take up the Budget Resolution in June. Until a Budget Resolution is in place, the House and Senate Appropriations Committees will not meet to establish the so-called 302(b) allocations for each of the various appropriation subcommittees. Until both the Supplemental Appropriations bill and Budget Resolution are completed, no mark up of FY 09 Appropriations bills will begin.

Most Congressional insiders now say that markup of the Defense and Homeland Security appropriation bills might begin in mid-June with the hope of taking those bills to the House floor before the July 4th recess. The fates of other appropriations bills, including the Agriculture Appropriations bill, are much less certain. It seems highly likely that we will begin the new FY 09 fiscal year October 1, operating under some type of Continuing Resolution and that such a CR will likely be left in place until after the November elections and perhaps until after a new President takes office next January. Stay tuned!!!!
